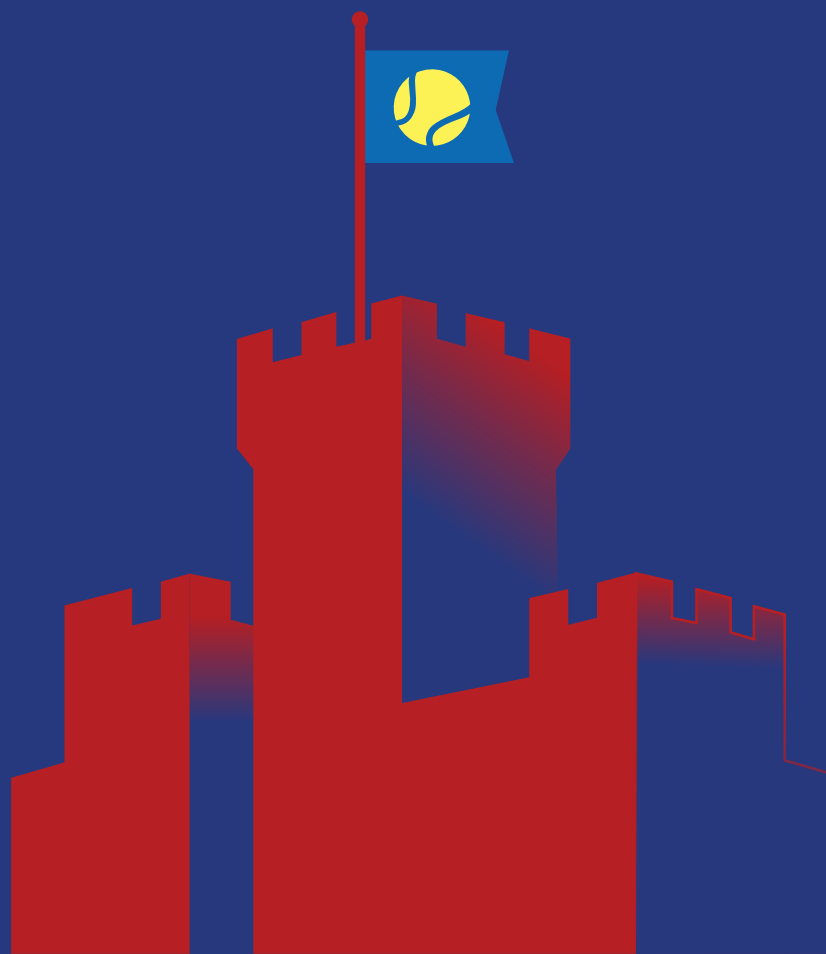

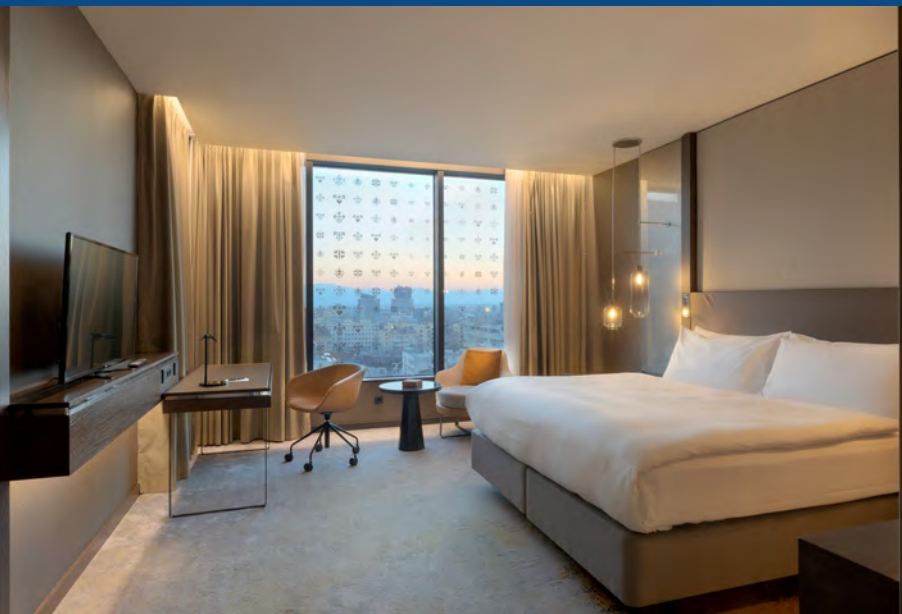
Swimming Pool

Ljubljana Castle

Ljubljanski Grad

Perched on a hill overlooking the city, this medieval fortress is Ljubljana's most recognizable landmark. Visitors can reach it on foot or by funicular and enjoy panoramic views of the city and the Alps. Inside, you'll find museums, exhibitions, and cultural events year-round.

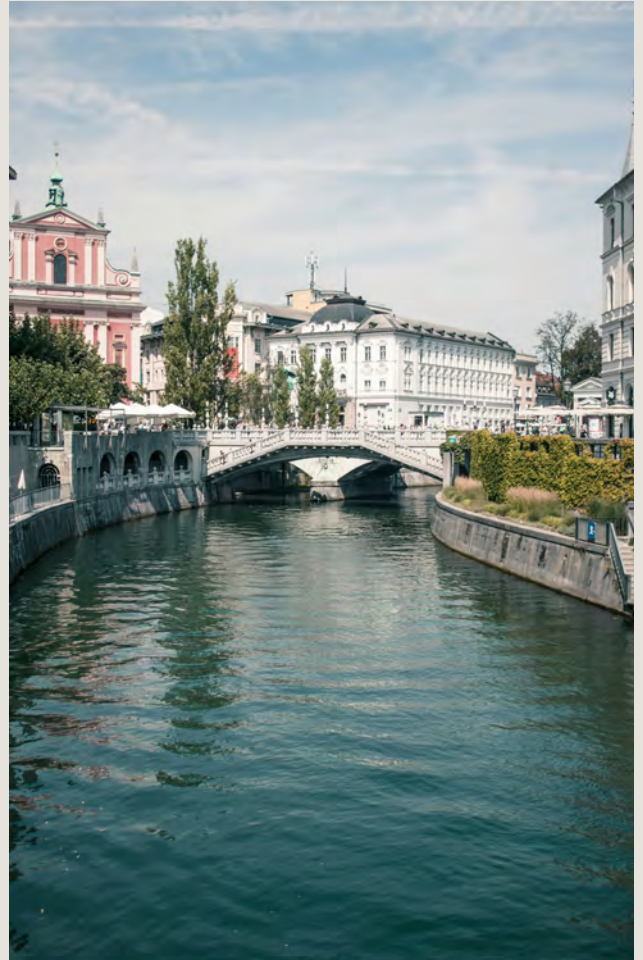


Triple Bridge

Tromostovje

The Triple Bridge is one of Ljubljana's most iconic landmarks, uniting the city's historic old town with its modern center across the Ljubljanica River. The central stone bridge was originally built in 1842, but in the 1930s, architect Jože Plečnik added two pedestrian bridges on either side, creating the unique triple structure we see today.

Plečnik's design combined elegance and purpose, featuring classical balustrades, decorative lanterns, and his signature geometric aesthetic. The bridge functions not only as a passageway but also as a public space—open, inviting, and seamlessly woven into the city's daily rhythm.



Located near Prešeren Square, the Triple Bridge is a lively meeting spot surrounded by cafés, shops, and views of Ljubljana Castle. Whether by day or night, it offers visitors a glimpse into the charm and creativity of Slovenia's capital.



Dragon Bridge

Zmajski Most

Opened in 1901, this is one of Europe's first reinforced concrete bridges and a symbol of the city. Its four imposing bronze dragons reference the legend of Jason and the Argonauts, who are said to have slain a dragon in the area before founding the city.

Cathedral of St. Nicholas

Stolnica svetega Nikolaja

With its distinctive green dome and elegant Baroque façade, the Cathedral of St. Nicholas is one of Ljubljana's most prominent religious landmarks. Built in the early 18th century, it stands near the Central Market in the heart of the old town. Inside, visitors can admire beautiful frescoes by Giulio Quaglio, a magnificent organ, and ornate bronze doors installed in 1996 to commemorate Pope John Paul II's visit. The cathedral remains a vital spiritual and cultural symbol of the city.



University of Ljubljana

The University of Ljubljana is Slovenia's largest and oldest university. Founded in 1919, it comprises 22 faculties, 3 art academies, and a university college. The university employs around 3,500 academic staff and researchers, along with 900 administrative and technical personnel.



National Gallery of Slovenia

The National Gallery of Slovenia, in Ljubljana, is the country's main art museum. Founded in 1918 after Austria-Hungary's fall and the creation of the State of Slovenes, Croats, and Serbs, it holds important Slovenian and European artworks reflecting the nation's culture.



Lake Bled

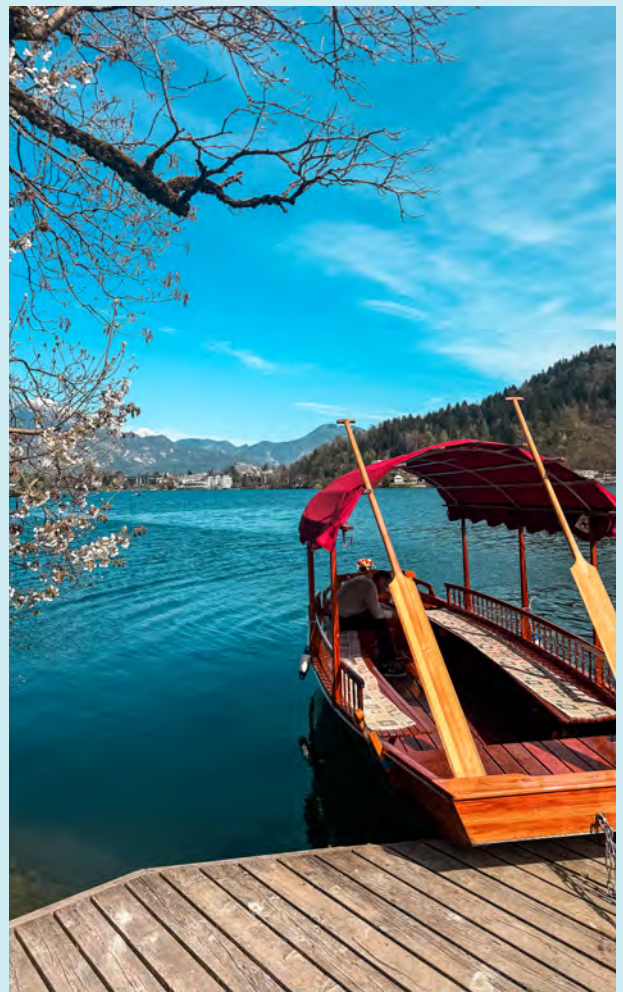
Lake Bled is one of Slovenia's most iconic and picturesque destinations, nestled in the Julian Alps and known for its emerald-green waters, fairytale island church, and medieval clifftop castle. Surrounded by lush forests and mountain peaks, this glacial lake offers a serene and enchanting escape that has captivated travelers for centuries.

At the heart of the lake lies Bled Island, home to the Church of the Assumption, whose bell tower rises gracefully above the trees. A traditional wooden "pletna" boat is the preferred way to reach the island, where visitors often ring the church bell for good luck – a local tradition with romantic and spiritual significance.

Towering 130 meters above the lake on a steep cliff is Bled Castle, Slovenia's oldest castle, first mentioned in 1011. With its striking red roofs, white stone walls, and panoramic terraces, the castle offers one of the most breathtaking views in the country. Inside, visitors can explore a museum that traces the region's history, a chapel, a traditional print shop, and even a wine cellar where you can bottle your own

wine. The castle's restaurant also provides a fine dining experience with spectacular lake vistas.

Lake Bled is not just about history and views – it's a hub for outdoor activity and wellness. The surrounding area offers excellent opportunities for hiking, rowing, paddleboarding, and cycling, while the lake's thermal springs feed into several nearby wellness resorts. Whether you're taking in the tranquil scenery, exploring cultural landmarks, or enjoying a slice of the famous Bled cream cake at a lakeside café, Lake Bled offers a perfect mix of natural beauty and cultural richness.





Postojna Cave



Postojna Cave is one of Slovenia's most extraordinary natural wonders and among the most visited show caves in Europe. This vast karst system stretches over 24 kilometers, filled with tunnels, galleries, and breathtaking halls adorned with stalactites and stalagmites formed over millions of years.

The visit begins with a ride on the world's only double-track cave railway, taking guests on a 3.7-kilometer underground journey through some of the cave's most majestic sections. Along the way, you'll pass through the Dance Hall, where elegant Murano glass chandeliers hanging from the ceiling create a fairytale-like atmosphere.

One of the cave's most fascinating highlights is the chance to meet the legendary olms, also known as baby dragons. These rare, blind amphibians are native to the region and have adapted to life in total darkness, captivating both scientists and travelers for generations.

Postojna Cave is a magical experience that blends geology, biology, and sheer wonder – a must-see destination in the heart of Slovenia.

Lipica



n the southwest of Slovenia, in the heart of the Karst region, lies Lipica, the birthplace of the legendary Lipizzan horse and the largest Lipizzan stud farm in the world. Founded in 1580, this estate is much more than a breeding farm: it is a symbol of tradition, culture, and respect for the bond between humans and horses.

The Lipizzan horse, one of the oldest cultural horse breeds in Europe and the world, has been developed at the Lipica Stud Farm since its foundation. Although today it is mainly known as a white horse, most Lipizzans are actually gray. They are born dark and turn gray due to a genetic mutation.

Currently, more than 300 white horses roam freely across over 300 hectares of meadows and forests at Lipica. They can be seen training alongside riders at the Lipica Riding School, performing shows that combine precision and beauty, or pulling elegant carriages through the Slovenian landscape. Guided tours allow visitors to explore the daily life of the stud farm, its history, and its role as a national heritage site.

In December 2022, the tradition of Lipizzan horse breeding was inscribed on the Representative List of the Intangible Cultural Heritage of Humanity by UNESCO.

Lipica is a unique place where history, culture, and nature come together to preserve an invaluable equestrian tradition.



Croatia



Croatia is known for its diverse landscapes, rich history, and Mediterranean charm. From the ancient walls of Dubrovnik to the stunning Plitvice Lakes and its beautiful coastline dotted with islands, it offers something for every traveler.

In the northwest, the Istrian Peninsula stands out with its mix of Roman and Venetian influences. Cities like Pula, with its impressive Roman amphitheater; Rovinj, famous for its colorful waterfront and church tower; and Poreč, home to the UNESCO-listed Euphrasian Basilica, showcase Istria's unique heritage.

Istria is also famous for its olive oil, wine, fresh seafood, and truffles. It's a place where history, nature, and great food come together perfectly.

Rovinj

Rovinj is one of the most iconic and charming destinations on the Istrian Peninsula in Croatia. This picturesque coastal town sits on a small peninsula that stretches into the Adriatic Sea, offering stunning views and an authentic atmosphere. Its old town, with narrow cobblestone streets, invites visitors to wander through colorful houses that reflect Venetian influences in their architecture.

The highlight of Rovinj is the Church of St. Euphemia, whose bell tower dominates the city's skyline and can be seen from much of the coast. Beyond its historical and architectural value, Rovinj is known for its vibrant cultural life, seaside cafés, and restaurants serving local cuisine based on fresh Adriatic produce.

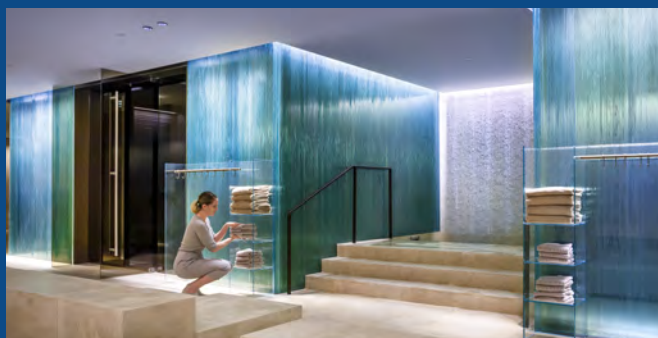
Beaches & pools

Pula

Pula, situated on the southern tip of the Istrian peninsula along the Adriatic coast, is a city steeped in history and cultural heritage. It is famously home to one of the best-preserved Roman amphitheaters in the world, the Pula Arena. Built between 27 BC and AD 68, this monumental structure is unique among Roman amphitheaters as it still retains all of its outer walls and all four side towers complete with their original columns. Made from local limestone, the arena could seat over 20,000 spectators and was primarily used for gladiator contests, public executions, and other grand events. Today, the Pula Arena continues to serve as a vibrant cultural venue, hosting concerts, film festivals, and theatrical performances that breathe new life into this ancient landmark.

Nearby, the Arch of the Sergii stands as another stunning relic from the Roman era. Erected in the late 1st century BC to honor the Sergii family, a prominent local dynasty, the arch is a triumphal gateway adorned with beautifully preserved reliefs and Corinthian columns. This monument symbolizes the power and prestige of Roman influence in the region and acts as a welcoming entrance to the historic city center.

Walking through Pula feels like stepping back in time, with layers of history visible in every corner. From the grandeur of the amphitheater to the intricate artistry of the Arch of the Sergii, Pula offers visitors a captivating glimpse into the Roman world, perfectly blended with the lively atmosphere of a modern Croatian coastal town.





Poreč

Poreč is a charming coastal town located on the western coast of the Istrian peninsula, renowned for its rich history and vibrant cultural scene. The town's centerpiece is the UNESCO-listed Euphrasian Basilica, an exceptional example of early Byzantine architecture dating back to the 6th century. This magnificent basilica features intricate mosaics that have been remarkably preserved, showcasing vibrant depictions of biblical scenes and saints, making it a must-visit for art and history enthusiasts alike.

Beyond its historical treasures, Poreč offers a delightful blend of old and new, with narrow cobbled streets lined with charming cafes, shops, and restaurants serving local Istrian cuisine. The town's waterfront promenade invites visitors to enjoy stunning views of the Adriatic Sea while strolling or relaxing at one of the many seaside terraces.

Poreč also boasts beautiful beaches and crystal-clear waters, making it an ideal destination for swimming, snorkeling, and various water sports. The town's lively marina is a hub for sailing and yachting enthusiasts, with numerous opportunities to explore nearby islands and hidden coves.





Brijuni Islands

The Brijuni Islands, a stunning archipelago off the western coast of the Istrian Peninsula, are one of Croatia's most unique national treasures. Comprising 14 islands and islets, the Brijuni are best known for their lush landscapes, turquoise waters, and remarkable blend of nature, history, and culture. The main island, Veliki Brijun, is the most accessible and offers an unforgettable escape into a world where Mediterranean tranquility meets rich heritage.

Once the summer residence of Yugoslav president Josip Broz Tito, Veliki Brijun was a place of political diplomacy and luxury. Today, visitors can still explore Tito's legacy – including a museum with photographs of world leaders who visited the island – as well as his private safari park, home to exotic animals like zebras, llamas, and elephants, many of which were diplomatic gifts.

But Brijuni's history stretches much further. Ancient Roman villas, early Christian basilicas, and Byzantine fortresses are scattered across the island, testifying to centuries of human presence. One of the most impressive sites is the remains of a Roman villa rustica in Verige Bay, which once featured temples, thermal baths, and seaside promenades.

Nature lovers will appreciate the island's carefully preserved ecosystems, botanical gardens, and a quiet, car-free environment perfect for cycling or golf. The archipelago is part of Brijuni National Park, which helps protect its rare plant and animal species, both marine and terrestrial.

A visit to the Brijuni Islands offers a rare combination: peaceful Adriatic landscapes, fascinating archaeological sites, and a glimpse into the lives of ancient Romans and 20th-century leaders – all within a short boat ride from the Istrian town of Fažana.



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
